

Some Interesting Information

- The chorus to which Gordon refers on the front page was written by Robert Harkness, a Bendigo born hymn writer and evangelist. He lived from 1880 to 1961 and is buried in the family plot in Birmingham, England. The chorus is based on verse 11 of Psalm 119: "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee."
- The Spanish flu pandemic lasted from January 1918 until December 1920. The virus infected 500 million people (a third of the world's population at the time) and resulted in the deaths of between 17 million and 50 million people. Some estimates suggest that there may have been up to 100 million deaths. This flu was the first of two pandemics caused by the H1N1 influenza virus. The second was the swine flu of 2009.
- The Black Death of 1347 to 1351 reduced the world's population from an estimated 475 million to 350 million.
