- During the birth of Jesus Read Matthew 1:18-25;
 - When the Angels visited the shepherds (representing Israel) Read Luke 2:8-20;
 - When the three Magi (representing the Gentile world) recognised Jesus as the Son of God - Read Matthew 2:1-12;
 - At Jesus's baptism, when the Holy Spirit descended on Him and God revealed His identity - Read Mark1:9-11; and
 - At Jesus's first miracle at a wedding in Cana Read John 2:1-12.

Epiphany closes out the Christmas season and turns our focus to Jesus at the centre of our lives. God made Himself known so that we may know Him intimately. He came into this world for you. Embrace Him with all of your heart.

"And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith." 1 Corinthians 15.14.



There will be protests again this year that the moment Christmas is over, the supermarkets will have hot cross buns for sale. Whilst obviously their appearance is for commercial gain, they are a great daily reminder that the Easter event is the cen-

tral fact of our Christian faith.

1 Corinthians 15 is arguably the New Testament's longest and most detailed treatise on Christ's resurrection.

Paul argues: If Jesus has been raised from the dead that proves he really was the Messiah. His death then was not a tragic and ghastly end, but God's strange means of dealing with the sin of the world. But, if he wasn't raised from the dead, he wasn't and isn't the Messiah, and his cross had no such effect. Sin has not been dealt with; the world is still as it was.

With Christ's resurrection, a new world has opened up, promising a life yet greater, more beautiful, more powerful, than this one. Without the hope of the resurrection, what is the point of being a Christian?

The bun with a cross on it is a great reminder of Christ's death and resurrection. That, and nothing less, is the Christian hope.
