What if the worst happened?

Will SA continue to remain largely free of a major surge in COVID-19 infection, or, at some point, succumb, similar to the experience of the Eastern states? Things are feeling a little poised on a knife-edge at the moment. The truth is, we cannot know; it could go either way.

Whichever way things do go, the Bible tells us that *it will serve God's good purpose for our lives*. Paul says, "We know that *in all things God works for the good* of those who love Him, who are called according to His purpose." (Ro 8:28) Yet, how can God work together for good *in all the bad things* (even in a pandemic)?

The Bible doesn't explain this to us; we usually only see the truth of it after the event. Yet obviously God knows much more and better than us how all of our experiences will work for our good.

However, we do know that in the death of Jesus Christ, God took the worst of evil circumstances and suffering, and made them bring about the greatest good – i.e., Jesus' victory over sin, evil and death forever, so that, by faith and repentance, we too can share in that same victory!



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All of our experiences - particularly the bad ones - throw us back upon Christ in faith, more and more, so that we are held more and more securely in the power of His victory. Evil events cannot separate us from Christ's victory for us, but only lead us further and further into it!

A Message from the Elders

The miracle, where Jesus feeds the five thousand with five loaves of bread and two fish (Mark 6:30-44), not only gives us an insight into how Jesus takes care of people's spiritual and bodily needs, but also shows us that with God anything is possible.

In this passage of Scripture, Jesus took pity on the huge crowd that had gathered around Him. He saw that the people were as "sheep without a Shepherd" and He taught them many things (verse 34). This addressed the people's spiritual needs.

In verses 35 and 36, the Bible mentions that the disciples urged Jesus to send the crowds away, so that they could go and buy food for themselves. Jesus saw this as an opportunity to address the spiritual needs of His disciples - notice Jesus's words in verse 37 and the disciples' response.

Jesus wanted the disciples to feed the crowd, not on their own strength, but by relying on His power as they had done before when He sent them out in pairs to the nearby villages, to preach repentance of sins and to heal the sick (Mark 6:6b-13). The disciples, however, saw only what they themselves could not do with the lack of resources they had at their disposal (verse 37).

The story concludes with Jesus performing a miracle, multiplying the food they had to be more than enough for everyone to satisfy their hunger (verses 38-44). Jesus proved to the disciples that He can make the impossible, possible.

How often do we not do the same as these disciples - relying only on what we ourselves can do, instead of believing that God can do the impossible?

An URGENT update from the General Secretary to Congregations and other ministries

15th July 2021

COVID-19 Restrictions in SA

The Premier has announced new restrictions applicable to churches effective from midnight (12:01am) Friday, 16th July 2021. These changes include:

- Density requirements for ceremonies (which includes church services, weddings and funerals) revised back to 1 person per 2sqm
- We encourage masks in contexts where it is difficult to maintain social distancing
- No congregational singing this Sunday (18th July), even wearing masks.

This means that there is to be **no congregational singing, chorus singers or choirs until further notice** - even wearing masks.

We strongly encourage congregations to consider the intent of this restriction and to seek to find other ways to worship together. Please pay special attention to the <u>SA Government</u> website as you prepare for worship and other events this weekend.

We expect that as per the previous direction, a small worship group of musicians and singers who regularly rehearse and perform together may be permissible.
