The Grace of God

Theologians point out that there is a sharp distinction between the use of the word 'grace' in the Old and New Testaments.

In the Old Testament, it can be used to designate kindness and graciousness in general, with no particular tie or personal relationship between the individuals involved. It is also used to signify a specific kindness that gives pleasure to both giver and receiver, thereby implying some sort of special relationship between them.

In the New Testament, grace indicates quite specifically God's redemptive love, which is always active to save a person to keep them in relationship with him. It implies God's continual, unfailing faithfulness both to his covenant and to his people forever.

Think of grace in terms of a statement: 'You are accepted.' You and I are accepted, fully and totally accepted by God, now, always, without condition, without deserving, without question. To be accepted in this way means to be cherished, to be loved, to be guarded from ultimate evil. It means that who we are is valued, honoured and respected. We are saved by grace through faith in Christ.

Grace is God's initiative. It is an expression of God's love for us, of God's desire, of God's unconditional acceptance, an expression of the very nature of who God is.

Such amazing grace!

Viva Alpha!

In the 2024 New Year Honours, King Charles appointed Nicholas Glyn Paul Gumbel (Nicky, as we know him) a Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) for services to the Church of England.

Nicky was born in 1955. His father was a German secular Jew who escaped the Nazi purges by emigrating to Britain. Both his father and mother were barristers, while the latter was a nominal Christian. Educated at Eton College, he then graduated from Trinity College, Cambridge, with an MA degree in the arts.

In 1974, while at university, he converted to Christianity. After graduating he became a practising barrister. In the meantime he had become a regular worshipper at Holy Trinity Brompton Church, Knightsbridge. It was there, in 1978, that his marriage to Pippa was solemnised. The couple went on to have three children.

In 1982 he ceased his law practice and began training for ordained ministry in the Church of England, graduating from Wycliffe Hall, Oxford, with an MA, in 1986. He was ordained as a deacon in 1986 and as a priest in 1987. He was a curate in his home church (HTB) from 1986 to 2005 and was the Vicar, not of Dibley, but of Holy Trinity, Brompton, from 2005 to 2022.

His universal fame was set in motion by the Bishop of London, who, in 1996, appointed him Alpha Chaplain. The course had been running since 1977. However, under Nicky's leadership he transformed it from being one designed for new Christians to one primarily for those outside the church who would not consider themselves Christians.

It was back in 2002 that Alpha, with help of Barbara Turner, long-time friends, Shirley and Ian Moulton, and new friends, Graham and Kay Johnson, brought the current editor from Greenwith UC to GGUC.
